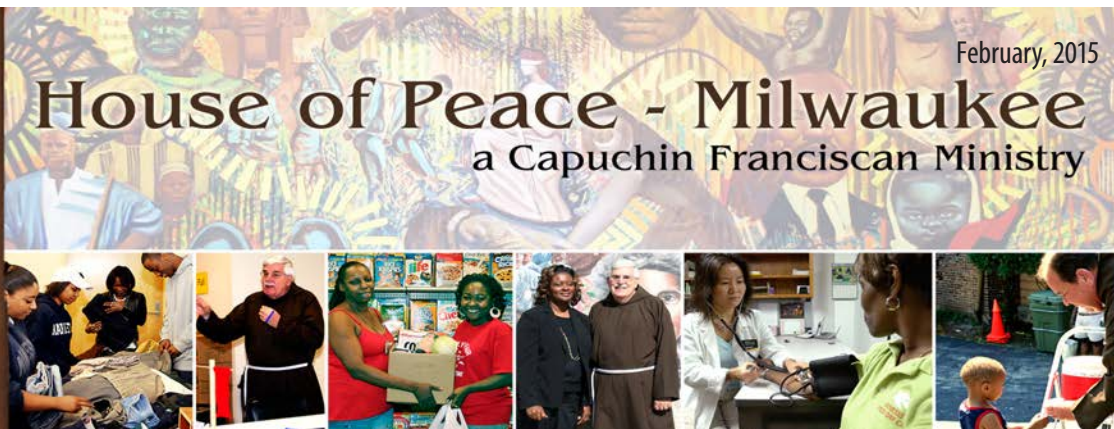

### Toys, Food Box, Warm Winter Drives All Help

Tears welled up as Andale remembered her life in California. She said, "I met my husband when he was serving in the military. I lived near the base and we fell in love."

Divorced, Andale moved to Wisconsin so her sons could be near her ex-husband and his large extended family. "They are wonderful and really love my boys. Da'Marreyah is 14 years old and Jumarion is 5 years old."

"I miss my family and friends in Southern California but it is much better for my kids to be able to have their dad and grandparents around," Andale said. "I lost my job in March as a head teller at a bank. I am also in school working on my B.A."

The economic strain of trying to finish college while unemployed led Andale to look up Christmas Toy programs on the internet. She found the House of Peace and contacted Gerri Sheets-Howard, Ministry Director.

Because of the generosity of our donors, Gerri was able to invite Andale to participate in a Christmas toy distribution. She also received her choice of winter clothing and all the food needed for a Christmas feast in a Holiday Food Box.

As this was Andale's first visit to the House of Peace Gerri asked her if she had received all she needed. Andale said, "Thank you so much, I am very pleased

with all of these gifts!" Andale continued, "I make ends meet right now by doing odd jobs. Sometimes I do some light cleaning and dusting but I don't qualify to receive any benefits." Andale's dream is to land a job in the HR

Department of a large employer. She attends Cardinal Stritch University while her sons attend Messmer Catholic Schools.

Turning to the gift bags Andale pulled several toys out and explained why she chose them. "My little one likes to draw so I got him some markers and a Curious George book." She continued, "For his older brother I got Ninja Turtles and the game, 'Trouble'."

As she thought about Christmas morning and her children's surprise at receiving the gifts she began to cry. "I feel very lonely here so far from where I grew up. But I know my husband's family will make sure my children have a great holiday so it is worth it."

Fr. Perry McDonald, Pastoral Director said, "One of our Capuchin values is hospitality and we define it as creating an environment where people are safe,

welcomed and their gifts are valued. We can minister to those, like Andale and her family, because our donors give us the funds, food, toys and clothing to share. I thank everyone for their generosity during the holidays. You are doing so much good for people like Andale who are making large sacrifices for their children."

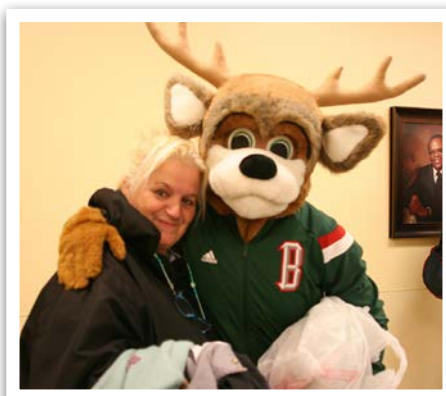

# Dove Notes

**W**hen I worked in Cordova, Alaska for a few weeks I was told that there was a beautifully clear lake, named Crater Lake, at the top of a small mountain. But the people of the village told me it was a difficult climb; nonetheless I decided to try it. The trail was, indeed, exhausting. At times I had to follow a stream, stepping on large slippery rocks; at other times the path was so narrow that I had to lean against the hill so as not to tumble off of it. But after a hike of 90 minutes I came upon a small lake cradled in the crater of the mountain. I sat for a long time, now realizing that I was the only one there, enjoying its simple beauty as I ate my lunch. Indeed, the hike was difficult, but worth it.

Abram and his wife Sarah were invited by God to go on an extremely long hike into a land where God would eventually tell them to settle down where they would be rewarded as the founders of a new nation (See Genesis 12:1-4). Jesus told Peter, James and John to climb a mountain with him (wouldn't they be more comfortable on water than climbing up hills?) where they were

rewarded with a vision of Jesus in conversation with Moses and Elijah (See Matthew 17:1-9).

All this helps me remember that as we move more into Lent we are being invited to take up some difficult new tasks that will bring us closer to God or to one another. It is easy to shy away from difficult choices that would increase our charity to another or to the poor that would help forgive another for past hurts that would make us more open to God through prayer. It can be hard to choose a penance that would truly help us. But the rewards are worth it, as Abram and Sarah, Peter, James, John, and multitudes of Christians have experienced as well.

Can you choose a penance that would help the guests who need the House of Peace?
