Apprenticeship Secured, Guest Thanks Supporters Food, Clothing, Counseling and a Roof Over His Head

Thin and athletic, you can see that Kaiphus works in construction. "I worked as a laborer remodeling large apartment complexes," Kaiphus said. "I would go in and do the demolition on the projects. I felt I was being exploited so I wanted to get into a trade rather than just hauling debris."

Kaiphus confided, "I have a mental illness and have been homeless. Capuchin Community Services has been key to my recovery. I depend on them for food, clothing and shelter

right now." Linda Barnes, Social Worker explained, "Time for a Turnaround is our program to help guests like Kaiphus stand on their own. The goal is to help guests who don't like how their life has been going to find the strategies that will help them create a better situation for themselves."

Linda paused and added, "Everyone ...has... their personal issues and concerns. All have been healed by grace, and now they are learning to walk in their gift of healing. This is a spiritually based group. We know that God first is the only way to achieve a true and everlasting turnaround. We know that there is hope in all situations."

She continued, "Kaiphus is in our men's group. These men... have come with their own issues, but it is amazing to see how they encourage and support each other. They can put aside self and focus on the person whose issue is on the table. It is obvious that each man is concerned for the growth and welfare of every brother. These men are awesome!"

Kaiphus agreed and said, "Ms. Barnes is a real good facilitator. When you had a problem, you put it on the table and have input on how to solve it. Much better than trying to solve it alone!" He explained, "I was able to identify what my goals were including getting into a drywall finish apprenticeship and any obstacles. Capuchin Community Services helped me get and submit my transcripts to the apprenticeship program. Then they helped me get a driver's license including applying online, setting up a test date and

getting the fee together for that license."

A resident of the Capuchins Apartments for almost a year, Kaiphus said, "I've lived with other people, "couch surfing" when homeless. Now I have permanent housing of my own. I don't share it with anyone else so no one else's problems are mine. That also helps me focus on my goals."

Br. Rob Roemer said,
"The Time for a Turnaround
program really reflects one of
my province's primary values,
Empowerment." He explained,
"We accept our guests where they

are and want to encourage them to find solutions to their challenges. We don't just want to solve problems, we want to reinforce the self-respect and potential of every guest. That will better equip them for solving issues for themselves going forward."

Kaiphus said, "I know that you will share my story with the donors. Please thank them for me, without their support I would still be living on the street." With a big smile, Linda said, "Your attitude of gratitude just made my day!"



who struggle with securing the most basic of needs, she could be challenging on some days, and the biggest helper on most days.



St. Anthony Project

Update



Readers of this newsletter over the years have learned about the guests who are served by the Capuchins' St. Bens Community Meal and the House of Peace, their strength of character through harsh struggles while homeless, and our common humanity. So I know you will share our excitement about the progress of the St. Anthony campaign, which will transform the abandoned hospital building connected to St. Ben's into a flourishing center of care for the homeless community.

This historic transformation has multiple purposes, including a new indoor gathering space that will enable our guests to clean up, warm up and socialize before the meal, and enter the meal hall directly, rather than standing in a line outside. A space for showers, laundry, and other services currently being provided in the Capuchin's living quarters. And to top it all off, a space that will include 60 permanent apartments for people who are now homeless.

Local Gallery Offers Art Class Guests at House of Peace & St. Ben's Meal Included

Staff at the Portrait Society Gallery in the Third Ward have been working on an art project to give homeless and poor residents a voice. Kathleen Tousignant, Curatorial Assistant at the gallery located said, "Our art project and class, "On the Wing" was inspired by the homeless people we meet. We've taught classes at both the House of Peace and St. Ben's Community Meal."

Kathleen explained, "Many of these people are never heard by anyone. We give each participant a sketchbook and offer a payment of \$50 when they return the book to us. They have an opportunity to develop their artistic voice and we display the books at a special event where we auction them off to pay for more sketch books and art classes."

The vision for St. Anthony has gained the support of many compassionate people, neighboring businesses and philanthropic leaders—over 1,200 donors have contributed more than \$2,070,000! Thanks to this strong and timely support, Capuchin Community Services will be able to meet the financing deadline and construction is scheduled to begin this autumn.

Although we still must raise roughly \$400,000 for furniture, fixtures and related expenses for the new facilities, we are thanking God ahead of time, in the spirit of Fr. Solanus Casey. We are thankful above all that our new facilities at St. Anthony will have the capacity to offer the best care possible to the most vulnerable people in Milwaukee—the poor, the hungry, and the homeless.




